PUPIL PREMIUM FUNDING – REPORT TO PARENTS

Pupil Premium is a grant that is allocated to schools based on the number of children who are entitled to free school meals or have been entitled over the previous six years (known as 'ever six'). Brooke Hill Academy will receive £41,813 during this academic year.

We aim to spend the Pupil Premium Funding Grant to ensure that we are successful in narrowing the gap and raising achievement for those children from low income and/or other disadvantaged backgrounds. We have a Pupil Premium Policy and a designated member of staff responsible for monitoring the success of the plan.

It is a requirement of the Pupil Premium Funding Grant that we identify and make public details about how this money is spent and what impact this has on outcomes for children. It is important to recognise that pupil premium funding is not the only income that we utilise to achieve this aim and Governors are of course responsible for monitoring the impact of all spending decisions in terms of outcomes for children.

- We have identified all children on role that are eligible for this funding. The needs of this group are varied and these children are not all low achievers, so we ensure a broad and balanced provision for all eligible pupils to access.
- We have made sure that all teaching staff are aware of who these children are and they are being clearly identified on lesson plans and all tracking data so that progress can be monitored.
- Our intervention strategies and Quality First Teaching approach incorporates an effort to help our Pupil Premium children fulfil their full potential.
- We aim to ensure that all teaching is at least consistently good or outstanding so that the most vulnerable pupils have opportunities to succeed
- We recognise that early intervention is vital and children are having personalised interventions across both EYFS and Year 1.
- We are utilising the expertise of existing members of staff to work creatively to motivate and inspire our children e.g. delivery of the Forest School programme, Young Voices, music provision, enterprise opportunities and English as an Additional Language support where needed
- We are continuing with strategies that we already know work e.g. one-to-one tuition, using ICT to support learning, the delivery of daily phonics sessions, multi-sensory approaches to promote self-esteem and targeted interventions as well as additional pastoral support including nurture groups and counselling if appropriate
- Offering extended school support at our breakfast and after school clubs
- Using provision mapping to support the process of planning additional interventions and then tracking the progress made by all pupils at least termly
- Making sure that all children have access to good quality first teaching
- Developing role play opportunities to develop language and communication skills
- Provided Governors with materials and training opportunities to develop their understanding of Pupil Premium funding so that they are better equipped to provide challenge
- Set up identifiable cost centres on our school financial accounting system to track expenditure and aid reporting
